Extracurricular Opportunities

Volunteering

Internships

Qualified students of the Torino program may apply to do an internship in the community to gain experience in their field of study.

Field Trips

Optional Overnight Tours

Two optional overnight trips (3 days/2 nights) are also scheduled for the academic year. Detailed tour information will be provided upon arrival in Italy. Possible tours include:

- Veneto: Verona and Venice

The University

USAC classes are held at one of the most prestigious institutes in Italy—the Scuola di Amministrazione Aziendale (SAA), or School of Business Administration, of the University of Torino. You will find an exciting, challenging academic environment with students from around the world in most of your classes. After classes are over, you can enjoy a walk along the river and park which run behind the school or stroll to the Lingotto shopping center just two blocks away.

City Life

Overview

Named the Youth Capital of Europe in 2010, Torino is an excellent location to study and

practice the Italian language and to experience Italy's rich culture away from the crowded tourist areas. Torino was named the first world capital of design in 2008 for its creative energy and innovative production, and its strategic geographical location also makes other European centers (Rome, Paris, Berlin, Geneva) easily accessible.

Registration Information

Specialty programs are designed and operated by USAC. Students who participate in a Specialty program will be enrolled at Boise State University while abroad and will not need to transfer credits after returning. Most USACE Specialty courses have a Boise State equivalent course. Work with your academic advisor when deciding on courses to satisfy major requirements, and with a staff member at the International Learning Opportunities office for course registration and syllabi inquiries.
